# Donors invest **\$1.1 million** in diagnostic imaging technology for Emergency Department

One of the most important parts of an Emergency physician's job is to identify the most critically ill and injured patients in the Emergency Department. Your donations have funded the technology that helps them do just that...

PRHC's Chief of Emergency Medicine Dr. Mark Troughton says one of the most important parts of his job is to identify the most critically ill and injured patients in the Emergency Department.

"When we're on shift in the ED, we're concerned about the patients we have and committed to giving them the best care possible," says Dr. Troughton. "But we're also thinking about the ones we haven't seen yet because the sickest person in the hospital could be the one sitting in the waiting room."

It's no easy task. PRHC has one of the busiest Emergency Departments in Ontario, with more than 88,000 patient visits last year alone. So it's not surprising to hear that he and his colleagues depend on having access to state-of-

the-art diagnostic imaging technology, particularly X-Rays, 24 hours a day, 7 days a week to help them get that patient treatment as quickly as possible.

"Whether we're diagnosing a broken bone or confirming life-threatening congestive heart failure, having timely access to high quality X-Ray technology is central to our ability to provide the highest quality patient care," says Dr. Troughton.

PRHC has two X-Ray trauma suites dedicated to emer-

gency patients and on a typical day, an Emergency Department physician might see 40 patients and send at least half of them for an X-Ray for an annual total of 23,400 exams.

Last year, the hospital advised that these suites were reaching the end of their

## Richard Tattersall is investing in his family's 'hospital at the lake'

## One summer resident shares the inspiration for his \$50,000 pledge

Since he was three years old, Richard Tattersall has been spending much of his summertime at the family cottage on Lower Stony Lake. His parents originally purchased the cottage he now shares with his wife, Alessandra, and their three sons aged 15, 18 and 21.

His mother still spends time there with the family every summer, as did Richard's father until he passed away two years ago at the age of 91.

Peterborough Regional Health Centre (PRHC) is the Tattersalls' hospital at the lake. Richard has been supporting the PRHC Foundation's work to fund the equipment and technology that form the backbone of patient care at PRHC for some time. He was initially inspired to give because he believes that having a world class hospital is an important strength in a region's infrastructure.

Although already a priority for Richard, it was comforting to know that as his father aged, excellent healthcare was available at PRHC if he ever needed it– thankfully, he didn't. Then last summer one of Richard's sons required urgent care. They attended PRHC's Pediatric Out Patient (POP) Clinic, part of the hospital's emergency care system, where they were impressed with the staff and the high level of care they received.

Once again inspired to invest in his family's hospital at the lake, Richard has made a multi-year pledge of \$50,000 to the Foundation in support of PRHC's highest priority needs.

Richard believes that although the goal at the lake is to escape from the week's stress, it's also where urgent care is especially important for multi-generational families busy making memories. He points out that due to everything from childhood illnesses to outdoor accidents, it's important to have a hospital "neighbour" that offers the quality healthcare families need while at the lake. He compares having access to great care with oxygen: "You don't think about it until you have a shortage."
